

Dear Friends,

'Tis mystery all! Th'Immortal dies! Who can explore his strange design ...

These words come at the beginning of the second verse of Charles Wesley's famous hymn that begins, "And can it be ..." In these few brief poetic words, Wesley encapsulates what lies at the heart of the Christian faith – the death of God. Nearly



250 years later, Graham Kendrick wrote another hymn for another generation and used poetry to make the same point:

Hands that flung stars into space, To cruel nails surrendered.

Wesley and Kendrick bring together what appear to be mutually exclusive characteristics of God's Son – his humanity and his deity. This is a conundrum that has puzzled Christian thinkers throughout the two millennia of Christendom. The label heretic was bandied about in the early years of the Church as people argued over what was described as the 'Two Natures' of Jesus. In my life-time there continued to be similar arguments which have caused divisions amongst Baptist churches. Who, indeed, can explore this 'strange design'?

That question was also raised by the writer of the Old Testament book Ecclesiastes. His view was that there are some things that are unknowable – God is God and we are not – so we might as well just get on with living our lives as best we can. Far be it from me to disagree with either Charles Wesley or the writer of Ecclesiastes, but I think that human beings *are* called to explore God's 'strange design'.

You will see elsewhere in this magazine some information about our Lent Groups which this year are using a study guide called *The* 

Mystery of Everything which is based on the film The Theory of Everything which tells something of the story of the brilliant scientist, Stephen Hawking. Human beings are the only creatures known to us who are able to 'know' the universe. For as long as there have been people, human beings have explored the earth and for a long time have also looked at the skies. We have tried to discover how it all 'works' and what laws govern it. In so-doing we are exploring the mind of God.

While we may not be able to fully fathom the way in which God became one of us, it surely behoves us to open our senses and our minds to explore the 'mystery of everything' that God has made. Because in answer to the question, 'who can explore his strange design', we can – and no one else.

## BMS Action Teams: "where mission begins"

Life-changing - Challenging - Faith-stretching

These are a few of the words that people have used to describe what it's like to go on a gap year with BMS. Action Teams is an experience that allows young people to grow and also to serve God and others around the world.

But what happens when the year is over? Here are three exciting stories from former Action Teamers who share how doing the BMS gap year programme inspired them down further paths of mission.

#### Life-changing

Sarah Whybrew fell in love when she went to Thailand on an Action Team in 2010/11. But not in the way you might be thinking. "I came back with a love for Thailand and overseas mission," says Sarah. "It was life-changing."

Sarah's heart was transformed while she was in Thailand working with disabled children and helping to run after-school Bible clubs. The challenge gave her a new-found confidence and changed her view of God. "I realised that God is not just an English God," says Sarah. "But that actually he's a God that understands and loves all languages and people."

Sarah's heart for the world grew when she did mission, and the experience impacted the path she took when she returned to England. After going to university, she felt God call her back to her beloved Thailand, this time as a Christian gap year team leader.

Returning from Thailand a second time, Sarah still felt God's call on her heart to overseas mission. A door opened when an opportunity to work as a Short-term Programmes Administrator at BMS presented itself. Today, that's where Sarah continues her mission journey. "I love working for a place where there

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are maps on the walls and we have people come into the office who've been working overseas," says Sarah. "I find it so inspiring when they share about what they've been doing and how God's been using them around the world."

#### Challenging

Doing an Action Team year with BMS taught Brian Leitch to overcome challenges and develop his own faith. It also showed him that he wanted to embark on a life of overseas mission. "For me, it was the first time away from home," says Brian. "It was all about being in this completely new world where you have to learn to stand on your own two feet and build connections within a new community."

Brian went to Jamaica in 1994/95. His Action Team's mission was focused on doing youth work in schools and churches. Brian remembers how the challenging moments strengthened his faith, like when he was asked to preach at church. The thought was terrifying to Brian, he didn't believe he could do it. "It was a situation where I felt totally out of my depth," says Brian. "And it really made me stop and think, who do I trust in these kinds of situations? It taught me to look to God."

Following his gap year, Brian studied economics and politics at university, and then went on to complete a Masters in development economics. After university, he decided to pursue overseas mission with BMS. Since September 2014, his wife Mo and their two children, Evie and Eddie have lived in India. They have been helping women who've been impacted by gender based violence by equipping churches to stand up for them.

When Brian reflects on the journey he took to get to where he is today, he wouldn't have it any other way. "Doing an Action Team was a life-changing experience," says Brian. "I would recommend it to anybody."

#### Faith-stretching

Trusting God – it's one of the most important lessons God taught Debbie Drew when she did her Action Team year in Brazil in 1993/94. Her strengthened faith would prove to be a crucial quality that she'd carry with her as she embarked on a challenging (and rewarding) life of mission in the years to come. "Action Teams taught me to depend on God," says Debbie. "I learnt that he was with me, wherever I was."

Debbie and her team helped with church planting and children's work while in Brazil. She remembers how deeply moved she was by the poverty that surrounded her. "I saw people who didn't have anything," says Debbie. "It made me reflect on my own privileges, and how those privileges meant that I had a responsibility to help others."

Debbie's gap year experiences motivated her to continue stepping out of her comfort zone and helping those most in need. Beyond Action Teams, her heart for mission eventually led her to live and work with youth in tough, inner-city London.



That experience in another challenging environment inspired her and her husband Chris to apply to do overseas mission with BMS. Together with their children, they have lived and worked in Afghanistan and now are living in Nepal, where they've faced tough times with the 2015 earthquakes and the recent fuel crisis. "Mission has taught me that I can go wherever God wants me to be," says Debbie. "It has also given me the confidence to go to challenging places where other people aren't always willing to go."

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#### Step out in faith

Trusting God, overcoming challenges, developing faith and having your heart transformed – those are just a few of the rich blessings that can come from an Action Team experience. And sometimes (as seen from these stories), it can lead a person to continue a life of overseas mission. "Doing mission is an adventure," says Debbie. "Sometimes I think that if I'd known everything that was going to happen, I might not have taken that step. But that's what being a Christian is all about, isn't it? Stepping into the unknown, trusting God and taking a journey with him."

If you're between 17 and 23 years old, why not check out the opportunity to serve God around the world? If not, maybe you know someone who you could share these stories with – it might be just the thing they need to hear to begin their own mission journey.

# UNLOCK WALK - Saturday 29th April

Unlock is one of the Christian charities we support through planned mission giving and once again we plan to support their annual fundraising London Walk. Working in deprived urban areas across the country, they "unlock" real life stories of ordinary people and explain to them the good news of a down to earth Christ. Their main single source of income is from the sponsorship and donations received by walkers and churches supporting their annual London walk. Last year's walk raised over £26,000, for which UNLOCK are extremely grateful, but the current economic climate, with charitable trusts having less money to distribute and more applications for their money, means that the walk proceeds are more important than ever.

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As well as raising money for the charity to continue its work in deprived urban areas across the UK, the walk also aims to raise awareness of the issues of exclusion and to showcase the ministry of churches in urban areas. It also gives churches from more affluent areas an opportunity to support the work of fellow Christians in the inner city, as well as providing 100's of people an opportunity for an unusual and enlightening day out in London.



This year's walk is around Battersea and Balham and the 7 mile route passes through Battersea Park and Clapham Common and includes the area known as "Lavender Hill", once famous for the Lavender which grew well on the gentle north facing slopes of this part of the Thames Valley. There will be stops at seven churches along the way where we can rest and refresh, and see some of the ways in which church and

community work together to serve one another.

Copies of the route map are available on the table in the vestibule, so please take one if you are interested. If you want to join us for the walk we will meet at St Albans City Railway Station at 8.30am, on **Saturday 29**<sup>th</sup> **April**, for the journey to Clapham and an inspiring and invigorating day out.





#### 25th March LIFE IN A LAGOON

A 16 year old lad in a coastal village was kidnapped by slavers. Taken to their wild country across the sea, he endured a harsh life. In desperation he prayed to God, and after five years he escaped and made it back home. The lad now had a mission—to preach the faith to the men who had abducted him. He did this so well that he became the Christian figurehead of the once savage island nation. Which is how the English boy Patricius became St Patrick of Ireland.

It is rather difficult. Here take this coin, and go down to the inn at the bottom of the road, they will give you a hot meal and shelter".


Night fell and Crispin realised that there would be no more callers. Deeply disappointed, he went to bed and fell asleep.




