Dear Friends,

Over the last 17 years, I have preached on around a dozen occasions outside this country. Most of these opportunities have come in Kentucky and Texas. Some of the churches have been quite large, while a couple had fewer than 100 members. There have been some memorable experiences. Amongst them was the occasion when I was called on to preach in a church in Louisville immedi-



ately after the choir had sung, as an anthem, a Gospel song with a soaring tenor solo and it brought the house down. I wondered how I was going to be able to follow that, while one of my children said that they expected me to be lowered down from the ceiling like the star of a rock musical.

In August I will be returning to preach at Faith Baptist Church in Georgetown, Kentucky. Faith is a church where I have a number of friends from when I was chaplain at Regent's Park College which had a relationship with Georgetown College. The last time I preached there was 12 years ago on the anniversary of Paul Revere's midnight ride in 1774 to warn the American militia that, 'the British are coming'. I was able to tell the congregation in Georgetown, that it's taken a while, but we've finally arrived.

Faith Baptist Church has an important history of its own. In the 1950s Christians in Kentucky tended to meet in racially segregated congregations. Students at Georgetown College attended Georgetown Baptist Church, one of the two 19th century churches in the town. When some Nigerian students wanted to join the church, they weren't welcomed. It was out of this situation that Faith Baptist Church was founded. My friend Charles Midkiff, who was a student at Georgetown College at the time, stood alongside the Nigerian students as they were received into membership at Faith.

While the days of formal segregation are now past, just this year there have been a number of instances in which people with dark skin have been treated badly because they were perceived as behaving 'suspiciously'. America still has its problems, but we should not be complacent in the light of the of the way that the 'Windrush generation' have been treated.

There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

LEPERS ... I HEAL LEPERS



SUMMER PUDDING



300g strawberry
250g blackberry
100g redcurrant
500g raspberry
0r 1½kg mixed berries and currants of your choice
175g golden caster sugar
7 slices of day old white bread from a square medium cut loaf

Wash fruit and gently dry on kitchen paper. Keep strawberries separate. Put sugar and 3tbsp of water into a large pan. Gently heat until sugar is dissolved—stir a few times. Bring to the boil for 1 min. then tip in the fruit (not the strawberries). Cook for 3 mins over a low heat—stirring 2 to 3 times. The fruit will be softened, mostly intact and surrounded by dark red juice. Put a sieve over a bowl and tip in the fruit and juice.


Line a 1.25 litre bowl with cling film—overlap two pieces of clingfilm in the middle of the bowl as it's easier then trying to get one sheet to stick to all the curves. Let the edges hang over by about 15cm. Cut the crusts off the bread. Cut four pieces of bread in half, a little on an angle, to give

2 lopsided rectangles per piece. Cut 2 slices into 4 triangles each and leave the final piece whole.

Dip the whole piece of bread into the juice for a few seconds. Push this into the bottom of the basin. Now dip the wonky rectangular pieces one at a time and press around the basin's sides to that they fit together neatly. If the last piece won't fit in neatly just trim into a triangle. Now spoon in the softened fruit, adding the strawberries.

Dip the bread triangles in the juice and place on top. Trim the overhang. Bring cling film up and loosely seal. Put a side plate on top and weight down with cans. Chill overnight.

To serve open out the cling film then put a serving plate upside-down on top and flip over. Serve with leftover juice, any extra berries and cream.

News from our BMS Partner Judy Cook at Hope Home, Chiang Mai, Thailand.

Dear Friends,

Greetings from what is now a very hot and humid time of year here in Chiang Mai. The constant heat can prove to be guite draining for all of us but especially for the children who have sufficient health challenges already. Young Joy, our 10 yearold girl at Hope Home, generally has a tough time each hot season and now is no exception although she now copes a bit better. However, during the last year, she faced two major life changing surgeries ... a tracheotomy to reduce her constant fight with pneumonia, and a gastric feeding tube to enable more steady nutrition. So, to our relief we can see the longterm benefit and Joy has thus far made this year with only two spells as an inpatient in hospital and not too many sick days. Joy is a young girl who lives up to her name in full. She smiles and laughs through the toughest of times, and loves to watch others having fun, even if it is something she is physically unable to do herself. For me, Joy's immense tolerance of life's challenges, her ability to keep smiling and her enjoyment of other's joys are a constant lesson to me - to look for the positive in all times, to keep encouraging others to see the joy and hope in life.

Many of our staff at Hope Home do not yet know the Lord as their Saviour – they hear the children learn and sing worship songs, they watch Christian videos with the children and they participate in our Bible Story telling times. My constant prayer is that one day each of them will understand the deep-rooted joy that comes from knowing you are loved and accepted as a child of God – without this joy and peace in our lives the challenge of caring for children like our special children, with all their ups and downs, steps forwards and steps back, highs

and lows. The task of day to day care for these special ones becomes just that - a job. I long for each person caring for our children at Hope Home, staff and volunteers to come with a true heart of love and compassion - and this comes from being secure in God's loving care. Pray for one staff member, Ann (name changed), who has a background of constant rejection and hurt from her own family, raised ultimately in foster care and now trying to make her way through life as an adult alone. She and I have begun to get to know each other better and I feel privileged that she feels able to come and seek advice outside of work times on many issues. Recently, on Easter day, the children watched a cartoon telling the Easter story, and Ann watched and listened avidly. She is beginning to ask questions about Christianity from the few Christian staff we have and I pray that she will open her mind and heart to seek and find Jesus for herself. He is the only answer to the fear and rejection that she currently faces.

Recently we have held more joint activities between Hope Home and the Church of Christ in Thailand AIDS Ministry (CAM). The CAM staff use these times to gently come alongside the Hope Home staff to encourage and build them up. Pray for the opportunities here for the CAM staff to be a shining example of what it means to be a follower of Christ. Pray for the Hope Home staff to work together well as a team, to accept each other's differences, and to learn to love themselves too, and above all to meet Jesus for themselves. Increasingly the staff are as much of the ministry here at Hope Home as the children are, and God is teaching me many lessons in patience, perseverance, and forgiveness through the exchanges. I am grateful to the CAM staff, and work colleagues at Hope Home as a sounding board for advice on staff management issues.

In a few months' time I will be home on Home Assignment and am looking forward to sharing stories and experiences from both Hope Home and CAM. Thank you so much for the prayer support, financial support of BMS and the many other forms of encouragement we receive here – we cannot be here and sharing our lives in this way without you. We are all part of the wider ministry of making Jesus known and are partners together, wherever

and in whatever way God places us.



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




TOO BIG TO HAVE WALLS'

Last month in the Supplement on the Cross Street Centre I explained that we were on the threshold, waiting to enter the building, but that some technical points were waiting to be resolved.

A number of these concerned safety, such as uneven paving areas, ramps and stairs. The architect has requested the builder to make haste to correct these points, and we are hopeful that the main problems can be sorted out by early June. A large number of smaller snags remain to be corrected and these may spread over the summer and into the autumn (the builder has a six month period to correct all the agreed snags).

David Russel's building group, supported by the full diaconate, has been working hard to ensure the best interests of the church are safeguarded in a series of physical examinations, discussions and negotiations. These have been very time-consuming, and have taken a great deal of energy. We are very grateful to all the many people who got involved, particularly David Russell and Norman MacLeod.

Ken Rankin's group are pressing on with the fitting out stage. The floor-coverings are on order and many other decisions are being worked on. As soon as the building is ready (even though some parts, like the kitchen, will not be finished) we will begin to use it.

Further discussion on the financial implications of the new pattern of work are planned at the June Church meeting. Until we are given the go-ahead on this we have not progressed the idea of a paid catering supervisor, and a temporary administrator.


Many thanks to all those who volunteered to help in

various aspects of the future work. There will still be plenty of opportunity to take part even if you have not signed a piece of paper, and there is room for other ideas. The level of support has turned out to be extremely encouraging.

That reminds of something that Rex Mason said in his recent evening sermon. As in Zachariah 2, Jerusalem was too big to have walls, so the opportunities and resources available to us are wide and open, it is as if Dagnall Street itself now has no walls. It certainly gives that impression from inside the Cross Street Centre, so "stand by for the unexpected" once the Holy Spirit starts to open our eyes.
