#### Dear Friends,

I've become aware of a couple of expressions over the last few years, both of which have to do with relationships. The first is sometimes used as an acronym – LAT – 'living apart together'. It describes the situation when a couple are in a relationship but do not live in the same house. The second expression is 'conscious uncoupling'. This was coined by Katherine Woodward Thomas but came to public attention when used by



Gwyneth Paltrow to describe her divorce from Chris Martin. As with most things to do with Ms Paltrow, the explanation of 'conscious uncoupling' seemed to complicate matters more than it elucidated. The nub of it seemed to be that Paltrow and Martin were divorcing, but without blaming one another for their split.

At the time of writing these two expressions – 'living apart together' and 'consciously uncoupling' – could both be applied to two current situations. With the election now a distant memory and Brexit having been 'sorted', if we wondered what we would have to talk about, the Duke and Duchess of Sussex have decided that they want to 'step back' from the frontline of Royal life. They are 'consciously uncoupling' themselves from the rest of the Royal family but plan to 'live apart together' with the rest of them.

This also seems to apply to Brexit. The UK is 'consciously uncoupling' itself from the European Community, but we will be 'living apart together' with our friends from across the Channel.

Human beings have all sorts of relationships. There are relationships between groups of people – including between nations. Then there are relationships between us as individual people – within our families, with colleagues, with our friends, with those we serve and those who serve us.

The Bible tells us that God is personal – meaning that God relates to human beings personally. This implies that God chooses to be in relationship with us. In the Old Testament that relationship is expressed in terms of covenants – mutual promises between God and his people. The New Testament tells us that God has made a new covenant with us. The New Testament tells us that God came to live amongst us and has promised always to be with us through God's Spirit.

This 'new thing' that God has done means that we now have the opportunity to 'live with' God, rather than 'live apart' from God. The story of Jesus is of a God who wants to 'live with us' and wants us never to be apart from him. This is the new covenant – a promise that is made to all people. There are 49 volunteer shifts scheduled every week and as at the end of December 63 people had taken at least one shift, with one person having been on duty 9 times in that month!

More volunteers are still needed as every week there are urgent appeals to cover one or two shifts as without all 7 shifts per night beeng filled, we are unable to open. If you would like more information, please speak to me.

# The Winter Beds Project

As the winter months approach and temperatures plummet there are people preparing to bed down and make the streets their home in St Albans, one of the wealthiest cities in England. The number of people rough sleeping on the streets of our city increases year on year and in winter time already vulnerable people risk their lives living on the streets.

The Open Door Night Shelter offers 12 bed spaces to homeless people in St Albans and additional beds when the weather becomes severe, but there still aren't enough bed spaces. This winter to prevent people from dying on the streets The Open Door Charity supported by the City Centre Churches will be setting up The Winter Beds Project to provide shelter to rough sleepers not accommodated in The Open Door Night Shelter.



## Lent 2020 Broken

The TV series, Broken, written by Jimmy McGovern and starring Sean Bean is set in an estate parish somewhere in the UK. The series focuses on the life and ministry of Father Michael Kerrigan, a Roman Catholic, priest who, despite past trauma and anxiety about his own inadequacies, attempts to bring the light of Christ into the lives of the people amongst whom he ministers.

The series portrays real life at its most gritty and unvarnished, and in doing so raises many questions along the way about how to live faithfully when life is very hard. A word of warning: there are a number of disturbing scenes and there will be some bad language.

This Lent course, written by theologian Paula Gooder, arose out of numerous conversations she had with people after the series aired. "So many people commented that they thought it would make an excellent Lent or study course that I thought it would be interesting to have a go. I have shaped the course around the principles of the series itself – which raises far more questions than it ever answers."


Each week in our Lent groups we will be showing one episode (approximately 60 minutes long) following which there will be discussion and prayer.

We also sent an Amazon voucher to our other BMS partner Judy Cook, who runs the Hope Home for children with special needs in Chiang Mai, Thailand. She responded with a special 'colourful' Amazon reply thanking us so very much.

#### 2019 Christmas Gift Service:

What an amazing response, once again, from you all as over 100 gifts were presented around the crib at our family Nativity service. They were gratefully received by St Albans and Hertsmere Women's Refuge for distribution amongst the children of the families which they care for. (There is a rumour that the Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh, left at the crib during the nativity, also went to SAHWR!)

You may recall that representatives from SAHWR, including their children's support worker, also visited us on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> December and provided an inspiring insight into the work they do. Here are a few bullet points from their talk:

- The refuge started in 1982.
- Since 2017, they also cater for men.
- They currently cater for over 60 children aged up to 17.
- Birthday and Christmas presents are distributed.
- On average, 3 months are spent in the refuge.
- They appreciate the gifts for children, but there is also a need to provide for the women and men.

SAHWR offers services to all victims of domestic abuse regardless of gender, age, sexual orientation, religion or ability. What they can do to help:

- One to one support in the community.
- · Crop ins for support and advice.
- Safe accommodation
- Safety planning to support leaving an abusive relationship.
- Support for children who have been affected by abuse. Triple R programme (Recognise; Recover; Resilience.)

# **Central Baptist Association (CBA) Prayer Focus:** Ramridge Baptist Church Luton:

Ramridge Baptist Church has served the Ramridge estate and north east Luton for the last 60 years. Our community consists of a diverse mix of ages, nationalities, backgrounds and faiths and, although we are a small church, we seek to provide a distinctively Christian voice within this mix. Dave Sunman joined the church as our new Pastor last Easter and has helped to develop a ministry to children with a new Kids' Club and ministry in one of the local primary schools.

Dave asks for us to pray:

- for opportunities to minister in <u>more local schools</u> in the coming year and for the integration of this children's work into the life of the church.
- for our <u>new youth Bible study</u> to develop and grow and for the introduction of a new youth club to make provision for the older children.
- that we make <u>meaningful connections</u> within our area as we face challenges in trying to become more visible in our local community.
- for <u>our leadership</u> development as we are an aging church and, in particular, need to develop new leaders.

#### **Breachwood Green:**

Is a village in Hertfordshire, near to the perimeter of Luton Airport. It boasts a JMI school, the Red Lion, a Community Hall and the Baptist chapel – and people and houses, of course. Population ca 1.000 (2011 figures). The church is a C19th listed building, and the congregation's roots are linked with the activities in the area of John Bunyan in C17th. The chapel is one of the hubs in the community. It hosts a community library and regular coffee mornings. Harvest - with its distinctive straw plait decorations. Christingle and Christmas are still community occasions. The chapel has good links with the local school and children usually take part in the special services. Congregations usually number between 16 and 25 with a mix of ages. Café Church is a more recent occasional experiment, and Christingle and Toy Sunday services are shared with the local Anglicans. Members also take part in an ecumenical Bible study group. Stephen Copson acts as Moderator and occasional preacher.

Pray for the church as its shares in the life of the village. There are all the joys and the hurdles of a small and rural community. Pray that newcomers will feel welcome. Pray for the school, its staff, governors and children. And pray for the congregation as they witness to Jesus in this small rural neighbourhood.

#### **Kings Community Church Letchworth:**

David & Christine Wheatley minister on a needy estate of about 1700 homes on the edge of Letchworth. With only a handful of folk in the church in full time employment, Home Mission helps to keep this vital work going. You can see more on this year's Home Mission video at centralba.org.uk

David asks for our prayers at this Christmas time as they have a particular opportunity: the church and the Central Methodist Church managed to get a shop in Leys Avenue (shopping centre Letchworth) for the Christmas Period and opened a Christmas Cafe for anyone to drop in on the three Saturdays before Christmas. Alongside giving free refreshments there were a craft corner, free gift wrapping service, free food distribution and the CAP and Experienced Christians to give advice and support at this time of year.

#### **Carey Baptist, Hemel Hempstead:**

Carey has just celebrated 340 years of Baptist witness in Hemel Hempstead. We celebrated in some style with food from around the world and with a special anniversary cake made by Jailza from Brazil, who has been recently joining us, with her son, at Sunday worship. Carey has been encouraged by the numbers of young families from a wide variety of origins, who have been joining us recently. But we are conscious that we face a range of challenges, as well as finding new leaders for Junior Church and for the church as a whole. Parking and finances are both issues which have been challenging us recently. We need, as ever, to ask for an increase in faith and to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus during a troubling time for our communities and our nation. In the next few months, a large complex of flats will be built close to our church building, which will quickly increase our immediate mission field. So our prayer, in this season of a big potential harvest but few workers, is for the Lord of the harvest to send workers into the harvest field. We continue to thank God for being clearly at work in Hemel Hempstead.

#### **Aston Clinton Baptist Church:**

Pastor Nick Harris says "At Aston Clinton there is a growing harvest field. Once the church stood in isolation, but now approaching it's 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary year the surrounding area is vastly swelled by housing developments. The youth work has had to be reshaped following the early death of our Youth worker and now has a mid-week drop in Youth Café as well as a Friday youth club, next year a group will be going to Mexico to build

housing for locals. A weekly lunchtime meal is planned for the September with a focus on the elderly and lonely.

Rejoice with us as we begin to see an increase in workers committing to the church and Sunday services morning and evening increase in numbers attending.

We would value your prayers as we reach out to families, building closer ties with the primary school commencing messy church and employing a children and family worker.

Please pray that we would know God better [Eph 1.17]. We are seeking more of the Spirit as we try and walk in step with him, not lagging behind or running ahead of him. Thank you"

#### **Tilehouse Street Hitchin:**

We have a long history; this year we have celebrated our 350th anniversary and have much to give thanks for. But now we look forward and are trying to discern, "Where do we grow from here?"

Between 35 and 45 folk meet on a Sunday morning; the majority of whom are retired which brings its challenges. But we have good links with the community through hiring out our extensive premises. 

# Pippa and Toby Vokuhl

On the topic of new songs, I am reminded of Psalm 96 (NIV):

1 Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth. 2 Sing to the Lord, praise his name; proclaim his salvation day after day. 3 Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples.

As it happens I have been asked to speak on Psalm 96 at our local church service on the 14th of December. Nepali brothers and sisters, as Christians, are singing a new song here. Having just witnessed the Dasain and Tihar religious seasons where gods and goddesses are worshipped and appeased all round us, it is a wonderful thing to hear biblical truths sung out loudly into the neighbourhood every Saturday, when church services take place. Sometimes too loud for us, sometimes off-key, sometimes with content which one might have tweaked. But nevertheless, the living God is being experienced here, and is declared here in word and song. In fact, the psalmist's words could have been spoken directly into a Nepali context:

4 For great is the Lord and most worthy of praise; he is to be feared above all gods. 5 For all the gods of the nations are idols, but the Lord made the heavens.







In returning to Nepal as BMS long term personnel, Psalm 96 also has relevance for us as a family. We have returned to the same place, but we also are singing a new song. That means rejoicing with local Christians and celebrating the Christmas season here with song and dance as customary. It also means working through the implications of a more permanent existence in country and culture. This is not a short career break anymore, but a very different professional and life journey. Whatever the temporary challenges with work or culture were, these have to be accepted as ongoing challenges now. Temporary uncertainties, due to visa or educational uncertainties, become ongoing facts of overseas life. Friends coming, and friends going, that is also part and parcel of what we have signed up for. Our new song therefore this season, is that of being ready to be changed by circumstances, to become resilient as necessary, but in doing so to carry out the works God has prepared for us to do, and to 'declare His glory among the nations'.

We were delighted to have met with so many friends in the UK this summer, and to continue our journey in a very conscious partnership with you.

#### February 2020

We would love you to join us in prayer for the below:

- 1) It has been a real pleasure, and answer to prayer, to see the Multi-Purpose Learning Centre (Chapel) come into use at Green Pastures and witness the first church services and INF events in this beautiful and functional space. Please also continue to pray for good progress with the new Palliative Care Building, which my colleague Gordon Russel is project managing, and some new GPH staff accommodation, which I am taking through the design stages.
- Please pray that Gordon and I can set up good systems for the INF Engineering Team and can recruit another local engineer to complete the team. It would be great if we can find a suitable Christian engineer.
- 3) There seems to be a possibility opening up for me to conduct much needed research into the sociological implications of post-earthquake housing here. Do pray that this can be formalised and progressed.
- 4) Jakey, Ella and Millie are thriving at their school, for which we are very thankful. Please pray for educational arrangements from summer 2020, as most teachers at the school are due to leave the country, and no replacements are currently firmed up! Pippa also appreciates prayer for teaching history and RE to year 7/8s, this is not her professional background, but fulfils a need here.
- 5) We are delighted with our new household help Tara, who is a pleasure to be around, and makes tasty cakes and biscuits. Tara is Hindu, and it would be amazing if she experienced God's love for her and her husband, who suffers from motorbike accident induced injuries.

6) Please pray that God will keep our hearts at peace in the midst of uncertainties, and that He will make clear where future work and educational possibilities lie here in Nepal whilst we make the most of our day to day opportunities in the now.



This is the season of clear mountain views here, God's wonderful creation. In drawing this update to a close I therefore want to quote one last verse from Psalm 96 which reminds the reader "6 Splendor and majesty are before him; strength and glory are in his sanctuary."

Would this be your and our song and experience this Christmas, leaving the recorders to one side...



## Fruitfulness on the Frontline – Being Whole-Life Disciples

Last Autumn we spent five weeks looking at the idea of life on the Frontline, using the excellent resources produced by the London Institute of Contemporary Culture. Frontline was an attempt to remind us all that being a Christian isn't just about 'religious' things... going to church services, believing certain things. No being a Christian is about our whole lives. Our relationships, work, hobbies, everything. Being a Christian should impact everything we do and everything we are. Because above all else being a Christian is about being on a Mission -- to join with God's work of bringing his Kingdom to earth.

It was a timely reminder that wherever and whoever we are and whatever we do, we all have a frontline on which God can use us. It was well received by the church and people were asking us, "What's next?"

The answer is... Fruitfulness on the Frontline. This will be an opportunity to think about *how* we can make a difference on our frontlines. It will shine a light on what God's mission looks like and what we can all do in our daily lives to help bring it to earth. The series is structured around that that awful preaching technique, 6 ideas that all begin with the same letter. The 6 M's. Modelling Godly Character. Making Good Work. Ministering Grace & Love. Moulding Culture. Mouthpiece for Truth & Justice. Messenger of the Gospel.

We will look at each in turn during our Sunday mornings and then in the week that follows we will gather in smaller groups to share and learn from one another's experience. (The older brother said to his father): "Look! All these years I've been slaving for you and never disobeyed your orders. Yet you never gave me even a young goat so I could celebrate with my friends." Luke 15:29

A poor Burundian woman found herself in a violent marriage. Her overbearing husband would write out a long list of household chores to be done each day before he returned from work. At the end of each day, he would tick off all that she'd done, and he beat her mercilessly if anything was outstanding. So she was beaten every night. To her relief, he became sick and died, and within a few years she was blessed to remarry - this time to a kind and loving husband. Gone were the lists. She simply loved serving him. Months into the new marriage, she found a crumpled piece of paper behind one of the cupboards. It was one of the old lists from her previous husband! She read through it nervously, wincing as the old memories came flooding back. But then, to her amazement, she realised that she had completed everything on the old list that very day. Father, I choose to follow you today, grateful that you want a relationship with me, not my obedience to a long list of rules.





#### Buy less RUBBISH in 2020!

Convenience has become catastrophe: our world is awash with plastic waste. An estimated 8.3 billion tons of plastic have been produced since the 1950s – that's equivalent to the weight of more than 800,000 Eiffel Towers – and only 9% of it has been recycled. The rest is still milling about in our ecosystems – mostly our oceans – where it will take hundreds of years to decompose.

Around a truck-full of waste ends up in the sea per minute (that's 8 million tons per year) and plastic pollution can now be found on every beach in the world - even on uninhabited tropical islands and in arctic ice - with an average 5,000 pieces found per mile of beach in the UK. Microscopic particles of plastic can be found in seafood, sea salt, honey, tap water and bottled water. The human health consequences of this are not yet known, but we do know that plastic pollution kills at least 100,000 marine mammals and 1,000,000 seabirds each year, threatening some 700 species with extinction. This is surely not how God would have us care for the world he entrusted us with. It's estimated that UK consumers throw away around 295 billion pieces of plastic each year, only around a quarter of which is recyled, and more than half of which is single-use packaging: items that are used for a very short period of time and then disposed of. That's drinks bottles, straws, stirrers, cotton buds, carrier bags, and of course the packaging of our food, toiletries and cleaning products. Though we assume that when we put things like this in our bin, or our recycling bin, they will be dealt with responsibly, this is sadly not always the case and much of our plastic waste escapes the system.

It seems like it might be almost impossible to avoid, but actually with a few small changes we can all buy (and throw away) less plastic packaging if we try.

At The Refill Pantry on London Road (just a few doors down from the Peahen) you can buy dried goods such as pasta, rice, beans, lentils, cereals, nuts, dried fruits, herbs, loose-leaf tea – even chocolate buttons! – all without any plastic packets. Just bring along your own jars, tins or boxes, fill them up, weigh and pay – or use the paper bags provided in the shop for a small extra cost. The staff are very friendly and always happy to show new customers the



ropes! You can also find plastic-free toiletries and soaps for sale here, and liquid refills such as household cleaning products, oils and vinegars. You can learn more about them, and find a full list of what they stock, at www.therefillpantry.co.uk

**Eat Wholefoods** is another small business providing a similar service and you can find them on the market on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and in their shop in Fleetville on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays (it's tucked away down a small alley next to KwikFit – follow the sign!). They refill containers with Ecover cleaning products at both locations, and can also refill your containers with dried goods in their shop. Meanwhile their plastic-bagged products are wrapped in cellophane, which is made from wood pulp and biodegrades when buried. Find out more at www.eatwholefoods.co.uk

**Buying local produce** often means less packaging, and plasticfree food can be found in abundance at the market and monthly farmers' market (remember to bring your own shopping bags!) as well as local farm shops such as Carpenter's Nursery (Sandridge) and Smallford Farm Shop (their St Albans-grown tomatoes are fantastic!).

Old-fashioned butchers and most supermarket meat/fish counters usually allow you to bring your own containers for your purchases too.

So why not make a little change this year and buy less plastic waste? Just one extra stop on your weekly shop could easily mean hundreds fewer pieces of rubbish in your bin across the year! Think global. Act local.



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
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

#### AMERICAN BLUEBERRY PANCAKES



#### Ingredients

200g self-raising flour
1tsp baking powder
1 egg
300ml milk
Knob butter
150g pack blueberry
Sunflower oil or a little butter
for cooking
Golden or Maple Syrup

#### **METHOD**

Mix together the flour, baking powder and a pinch of salt in a large bowl.

Beat 1 egg with 300ml of milk. Make a well in the dry ingredients and whisk in the milk/egg mixture to make a smooth thick batter.


Beat in a knob of melted butter and gently stir in half of the blueberries.

Heat a teaspoon of sunflower oil or a small knob of butter in a large non-stick frying pan.

Drop a large tablespoonful of batter into the pan to make a pancake about 7.5cms across. Make three or four pancakes at a time.

Cook for about 3 mins over a medium heat until small bubbles appear on the surface, then flip and cook for another 2 -3 mins until golden..

Serve in a pile pouring over the golden or maple syrup.
